What's New in RE

This information was presented during the service last Sunday, but we are putting it out again in hopes that all UUFW parents and members supporting the RE program will get this important information.

We've had a big change in RE this summer with the departure of our long-time Director of Religious Education, Sarah Skaar, and this has led to a few smaller changes—for now—that we want to share with you. First and most importantly, **Religious Education will continue** at the UUFW.

Finding a new DRE requires a process, so we want to tell you a bit about that. The personnel committee, which is a committee of our Board of Directors, met last week to create a job description for an interim DRE. We are posting that position very soon, and hope to find someone who can fill the position while we go through the steps needed to find a permanent DRE.

Those steps include finding out what this congregation wants and will support in terms of the Religious Education program. The Board has appointed an RE Task Force that will work on hearing your wishes. We hope you will communicate to the task force your understanding that a thriving RE program is vital for a thriving fellowship.

Once the task force completes that task and reports to the Board, the Personnel committee will meet again to write a job description for a permanent DRE. Then that position will be posted. We hope that many qualified and amazing candidates will apply, and that we will have a permanent DRE in place by the first of July, 2024.

In the meantime, until we have an interim DRE, you've got the RE Team to keep our program running smoothly. We have chosen our curriculum, "Moral Tales", which we have taken from UUA's Tapestry of Faith. We've had to make some adjustments to our schedule, though, because the RE team is small and we have a learning curve. For the time being, we are aiming to have RE classes for three weeks every month. Other weeks, we'll have a truly intergenerational service designed for families of all ages. This will involve more than the kids' play area in the back of the room by including children more fully in the service. Just as we want our children to be integrated more fully in our services, we want to include our adults more fully in our RE program.

Stephanie Taylor will continue as our nursery attendant, but we need to have two adults in the nursery every Sunday, so we still need volunteers there. While several people have signed up to serve as teachers, assistants, and nursery volunteers already, we do have to complete a background check (at no cost to you) before you can do any of those things. If you are

interested, please email (re@uufw.org or administrator@uufw.org), and we'll get that process rolling. Do know that we need you in Chalice House!

However, you can support our RE program even if teaching children or supervising toddlers isn't your thing. Maybe you can lead a story or activity in one of our intergenerational services or join our tiny RE Team to help with organizing and planning. Parents, we need you to register your kids to participate in our program. You can do so at this <u>RE Registration Link</u>.

Ultimately, we want our kids to know their grownups in this Fellowship, and we want you to know our kids. One of the most special things about a fellowship like UUFW is the intergenerational relationships that grow between all our members. We hope you'll be a part of that.
