South River Greenway Trail Phase 3 Project Update


The City of Waynesboro has completed the design of the Phase 3 Section of the South River Greenway Trail project, which is intended to make it easier for pedestrians and bicyclists to access Ridgeview Park from the previously constructed phases of the trail. As many of you may remember, the previous design included a two-way separated bike lanes on the north side of the road and one-way westbound traffic and parking on the south side of the road. There would have been no parking on the north side of the road as shown in the 2021 design.

After a great deal of public outcry, the City Council directed the city's consultant to revise the design to address the concerns expressed by the community at numerous council meetings and public hearings. The final result, which is the current design, has replaced the bike lanes and one-way traffic pattern with a project that consists of sidewalk improvements without any significant reductions in parking or one-way traffic patterns. The current design addresses all of the concerns that I raised with the city on behalf of UUFW.

UUFW will benefit from a new sidewalk within the existing street right of way along the north side of 14th Street as part of the project as shown in the image that I have marked up. The western portion of the sidewalk will be immediately adjacent to the curb but the

eastern portion of the sidewalk will angle away from the curb in order to provide a space between the sidewalk and curb to accommodate an ADA compliant ramp to the street level. While all permanent facilities will be constructed within the existing street right of way, the city is requesting a triangular shaped temporary construction easement of 146 square feet along 14th Street at its intersection with Pine Avenue to allow the grading necessary for construction of the sidewalk and the slope behind it which extends onto the UUFW property. The slopes behind the remainder of the sidewalk fall within the existing right of way and do not require a temporary easement. All slopes will be flat enough to mow.

The project does not include construction of any new sidewalks on the western side of Pine Avenue beyond the improvements at the intersection with 14th Street, as the funding is to be used only for the Greenway Trail Phase 3 project.
