As the end of the calendar year approaches, and I reflect on UUFW Board activities of the last few months, there are a few matters that I want to call to your attention as we move into 2024.

The first is our Religious Education program offered for children. As was announced back in October, Nancy Lay was hired to be our Interim RE Director for 16 hours/week while a search is undertaken for a permanent RE Director. Before a job description can be created and an active search can begin, we need to evaluate the program and make some decisions about the structure of the program going forward. Our survey will give all UUFW members an opportunity to weigh in on the RE program and share their expectations for the permanent RE Director. Please take some time to consider how we can best serve our mission statement that calls us to "Build our Fellowship into an essential resource for liberal religion in the Valley by providing for the spiritual development of adults and children" and respond to the survey. The second matter I want to call to your attention is that of our delegates to the UUA General Assembly. Delegates are authorized to vote on our behalf at this annual meeting that takes place every year in June. The 2024 GA will be all virtual and will take place June 20-23 and details can be found <u>here</u>. Looking further ahead, the 2025 GA will be multi-platform with the main event taking place at the Baltimore Convention Center. I've never attended GA, but I've heard from people who have attended in the past that it is a positive and uplifting experience. Anyone can register and attend, but to be a voting delegate requires prior authorization. Finally, some time ago the Board was approached by one of our members who inquired about making a pledge donation of stock.
