## **Look What's Coming**

Something exciting is working its way to the surface at UUFW, from planting seeds of "What if?" through plowing the fields of "How about?" It could lead to gathering the fruits of "Here it is!" Need a hint? It's based on the penultimate line of our Mission Statement—To build our fellowship into an essential resource for liberal religion in the Valley by providing for the spiritual development of adults and children. Did you guess?

We already have a program with its own team and acting director for children's religious education (CRE). What if we created a team to oversee a full program of adult religious education (ARE)?

Early this month four volunteers met with Rev. Paul to answer that question with more questions of their own. Acting Director of Religious Education Nancy Lay, Susan Clark, Annie Foerster and Tom Engle joined Paul to begin laying the foundation for a new team that would oversee a year-round schedule of adult learning opportunities. This action would support our existing definition and promise for Lifespan Learning.

One of the first questions was, "What might ARE classes include?" The list of topics was just a beginning: Social Justice, Spiritual Practice, Small Groups, UU History, UU Theology, Ethics, Tapestry of Faith classes from the UUA, Building Your Own Theology for newcomers and those who want to brush up, Cakes for the Queen of Heaven (women's theology), and more. The formats suggested offer flexibility: Books as a basis for discussion, established UU curricula, lectures, workshops, demonstrations, small groups or interest-based gatherings.

The planning group saw the new Team's responsibility as supporting Rev. Paul's offer of periodic classes as well as encouraging and supporting lay participants as class facilitators or co-facilitators, maintaining a year-round schedule beginning modestly with possibly four classes a year and building to at least one offering every other month in the future.

The group will meet again on February 7 at 2:00. They'll be looking more closely at classes already available through the UUA, studying the results of a survey Rev. Paul sent out last summer, and building a description for the future Team members regarding goals and tasks.
