The RE Program's Community Connection Inaugural Event: Valley Mission Food Drive & Fun Day

To help nurture the bonds with our community and reinforce the importance of service to and empathy with others, the UUFW Religious Education program has launched the **Community Connection Initiative**. At least every other month, we will partner with organizations in the SAW (Staunton Augusta Waynesboro) area to find worthwhile (and fun!) activities for our children and youth to plan and participate in. Our inaugural event will be a **canned food drive** (through Dec. 13) and **All-Ages Fun Day with <u>Valley Mission</u> in Staunton on December 14.**



Valley Mission strives to promote selfsustainability by providing case management, pastoral counseling, financial assistance and onsite enrichment programs, including an after-school program and mental health counseling. Valley Mission serves more than 700 unique individuals each year—24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It is the Shenandoah Valley's longest operating private homeless shelter, providing a temporary home, support and hope to our community since 1971.

To understand the critical and lifechanging services Valley Mission provides, one need only read the <u>success stories</u> on its website. Stories about families, like Katie, mother of two with a third on the way with health complications. She found the support she needed to have a healthy pregnancy and delivery, keep her kids safely cared for, and find a job and an apartment. And stories about individuals like Wanda, an unemployed woman in her 70s with no family. Her belongings had been stolen at another shelter, and her car was in danger of repossession. Valley Mission helped her enroll in classes, get a job and save money for an apartment.

Our Community Connection event with Valley Mission has two parts: a canned food drive to feed the body and an all-ages fun day to feed the spirit.

The RE team has begun collecting canned food and will continue through December 13th. Valley Mission has asked specifically for *canned corn, green beans, carrots, mixed vegetables,* and *whole potatoes*. Standard or large Number 10 cans are all welcome. Please place your canned donations in a bag marked "RE Valley Mission" in the Fellowship Hall lobby. If you prefer to donate a gift card, VM requested Food Lion or Walmart. Contact Melissa Hays for gift card donations.

The Valley Mission food drive is in addition to our ongoing collection for the emergency food pantry box and food bank. As you know, the holidays can be especially hard on housinginsecure families. Housing costs have increased in our area, so please consider donating an extra amount this year.

The All-Ages Fun Day will take place Saturday, December 14th, from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. at Valley Mission, 1513 W. Beverley in Staunton. We'll bring a variety of games, toys, and activities (board games, Lego, dolls, balls, arts & crafts—bring your favorite!) to engage shelter residents young and old. (If possible, bring a game or toy that can be donated.) Fellowship adults are very welcome to join in the fun and help bring a little joy to a Saturday afternoon.
