# The Religious Education Program Update

This has been a very busy three months for those of us involved in RE here at UUFW. We are usually spending the summer months planning for our fall programs, and this summer was no exception. We knew that changes were happening around the language of our values at the national level after the General Assembly. We also learned that many congregations were adopting JET PIG (justice, equity, transformation, pluralism, interdependence, and generosity) as a clever meme to help us remember these values. And so we began working with lesson plans to develop a program for our children.

Before all that happened, however, I spent a week in Highlands, North Carolina at *The Mountain*, a UU camp and retreat center, taking a UU course entitled "System Theory," which studies the ways in which strong religious congregations work. I came away energized and made some excellent connections with other directors of RE.

Back in Waynesboro, we began JET PIG lessons with our children. They named our stuffed pig "Jet Lynn," and built her a jet pack, because all our values are powered by love. Our lessons have all revolved around the newly identified values. We did an outdoor team challenge that illustrated equity as well as interdependence, and together we solved a jigsaw puzzle of the universe to

illustrate pluralism. On the Sunday before Halloween, the children wore their costumes and participated in pumpkin carving with their families. During recuperation from my recent illness, the RE team members stepped up to help out, including Erin Milnes, who taught the children some of our favorite hymns.

In September, we launched a youth group for the teenagers in our Fellowship. Emmett Crawford has volunteered to lead the group with the assistance of Renee Herrell, and the first meeting saw four attendees. The group will continue to meet on the third Sunday of the month during service time and will do a deep dive into world religions.

Another exciting development in RE is that three of us are now certified by the Unitarian Universalist Association as OWL trainers. OWL stands for Our Whole Lives and is a sexuality education program developed by the UUA, along with the United Church of Christ. Shannon Mills, Savannah Fersner and I have all been trained to teach this course to kindergarten/first graders and fourth grade through sixth grade. Our training was twenty hours on Zoom over the course of three weeks. It required us to actually teach a portion of a lesson to our classmates. We came away with heightened awareness of the value of this program for our children. We will be in discussion with Rev. Paul about ways to implement these classes in our Fellowship.

Finally, I attend the monthly meeting of what is called the Joseph Jordan Cluster. This cluster comprises Central Virginia congregations from Newport News to Blacksburg and includes ministers, retired ministers, and DREs. We meet monthly from 10-3 at various locations as a way to share ideas and reflections, as well as a way to offer support to each other. I have found it an invaluable way to establish contact with other DREs in the area.
