Cal Hauptle is something of a renaissance man. His multiple interests have taken him many places and led to many fascinating experiences. Service to others is the thread running through the range of his life's

work, including careers in theater, law and education.

Cal was born in Delaware, but as a child, he moved frequently with his family. As a student at Yale, he developed a love of theater. After graduation, he worked for several theater companies, including the San Quentin Drama Workshop. Cal claims one of his most memorable life experiences was when, as a very young man, he went to Berlin and other European locations to help the Workshop stage the plays of Samuel Beckett in the American vernacular, directed by Beckett himself.

Moving on from theater work, Cal went to law school at American University and eventually established his own law firm in the Northern Virginia area. He has been a practicing attorney for forty years of helping clients find justice. He still practices today out of his home office, focusing mainly on estate planning and business operations.

Later in life, an interest in how we communicate led Cal to get a Master's degree in writing and rhetoric, which he has taught in college classes. He enjoys applying all of his skills to tutoring students and helping people making major transitions. He is also a certified yoga instructor.

In 2024, Sunday service attendance averaged 59.3. RE attendance averaged 5.8 children and 3.7 teachers. Cal has lived in Staunton for the past three years and is still in the process of finding ways to make a difference in the community. His introduction to UUFW was through his friend and neighbor, Hinda Richards.
