What is to be Done?

This past Sunday, our Social Justice Team held a service titled "What is to be done?" It was created as an attempt to allow Fellowship members to discuss current events in a safe, communal space and to consider ways that we can work together and take action. We hosted breakout discussions for twenty minutes on seven different topics: LGBTQ+ Rights, Immigrant's Rights, Medical/Disability Justice, First Amendment Rights/Censorship, Reproductive Justice, Environmental Justice, and Imperial Expansion (Gaza/Ukraine).

The first ten or so minutes in these breakout discussions were spent expressing concerns and personal connections to the chosen issue. Then participants compiled lists of actions we can take. Not only is there plenty to be done but members of our Fellowship are personally connected to each of the issues in many ways, often directly. In this first article of the series, we would like to share what was discussed in the Reproductive Justice and the LGBTQ+ Rights breakout groups.

- Write letters to state representatives
- Donate to <u>Planned Parenthood</u> and <u>Blue</u> Ridge Abortion Fund
- Volunteer with Planned Parenthood (Charlottesville), Blue Ridge Abortion Fund (Charlottesville), Whole Woman's Health (Charlottesville), or Planned Parenthood (Roanoke)
- Protest in person
- Meet again as a group of concerned folks

What can we do about LGBTQ+ Rights?

- Support <u>Shenandoah LGBTQ Center</u> and their programming
- Keep attending local pride events in Waynesboro & Staunton
- Table at student volunteer fair (under the specific lens of being a welcoming congregation) at Mary Baldwin College
- Volunteer/figure out how to support the Lavender Lounge LGBTQ+ safe space at Mary Baldwin

- Generally, have more information about how UUs support LGBTQ+ community (takeaway cards defining welcoming congregations, for example) at all tabled events including Tree Streets Yard Sale
- Put together a brochure-style resource list for members and visitors that includes regional resources for LGBTQ+ community members
- Make sure that the Social Justice Team keeps sharing upcoming opportunities for allies to volunteer with local LGBTQ+ groups
- Shenandoah Valley Equality, a local LGBTQ advocacy group, has a potluck every first Friday. Mike Drumheller is hosting the next one at his home on April 11th, contact him for info
- Restart our once-active LGBTQ Ministry Team at UUFW
- Support the <u>Waynesboro Virginia</u>
 <u>Organizing chapter</u>'s current campaign to protect queer high school students at Waynesboro High. Social Justice Team can boost events related to this campaign (such as attending or speaking at School Board meetings)
