What is to be Done? (Part 2)

What can we do for Immigrants?

- Supply UUFW members with Red Cards to distribute to immigrants, businesses, schools and neighbors. The wallet-size cards list what is and is not required if people claiming to be police or ICE come to a residence or other location.
- Talk about, report, and find legal redress for people, of any citizenship status, not allowed to return from trips abroad for family visits, travel, study here or abroad, or conferences.
- Pressure Congress, regardless of party, to fix steps toward legal status and citizenship, especially Dreamers brought here as children and those with Temporary

- Protected Status (TPS) because of natural disasters or countries in turmoil.
- Be aware and vocal about the many workers—professionals to laborers—who provide critical skills and labor, whether fully documented or not.
- Help the many families of mixed visa and/or citizenship status. Some member might be deported or not allowed to return if they leave the U.S., however briefly. Many people don't realize that marrying a U.S. citizen, serving in the U.S. armed forces, or having children born here, neither confers U.S. citizenship nor prevents deportation.
- Support organizations that lost government funding but provided information and support to newly arrived immigrants and/or refugees.
- Also support classes in English and other topics on the complex road to citizenship.
 Years of residence, complex tests, and significant fees are required. Many groups providing these services have lost funding.
- Recognize, listen to and work to alleviate the distress of immigrants, refugees and dual citizens who thought they left behind the stresses now felt in this country, including beatings, arrests and disappearances.
