Oktoberfest 2025

I first learned about Oktoberfest from my mother. Her mother's maiden name was Bowman, anglicized from Baumann when her family moved from Ephrata, Pennsylvania to Bath County, Virginia in the 1800s. My mother and I enjoyed the Oktoberfest festivals at the Frontier Culture Museum in Staunton as a way of honoring her cultural inheritance *and* enjoying a brimming stein of beer!

But you don't have to have German ancestry to enjoy this celebration of all things Bavarian. Did you know that:

- 17-year-old Albert Einstein worked at Oktoberfest as an electrician. It may seem like a joke, but it isn't. As a teenager in 1896, Einstein and his family's electrical engineering firm helped install the lights in the Oktoberfest tents.
- Unlike normal beer, Oktoberfest tent brews are stronger, with an average of 6% alcohol, compared to the usual 4-5%. For truly adventurous individuals, there's Schorschbock, with 57% alcohol that costs over 600 euros per liter! However, you can get a much smaller and affordable 40ml bottle for around 30 euros.
- Oktoberfest in Munich attracts more than 7.9 million people each year. This results in a huge consumption of Bavarian beer and a boom for Germany's economy.

From April 2011 thru April of 2017, the Transatlantic Brides and Parents Association hosted a traditional English tea at the UUFW





each April and October. This small group of mostly English women included our members Laura Hiatt and Pat Grabowski (now deceased). At \$15 per person, for up to 72 attendees each, the 13 teas raised \$10,360. It was all donated to local charities, including New Directions, Boys and Girls Club, Love Inc, WARM, local Hospice and the Food Pantry.

Each tea featured 18-22 different British food items, such as scones, trifle, tomato tarts, Victoria sponges, Scotch eggs, curry puffs, petits fours and sandwiches, presented on three-tiered serving stands. Each table was graced with a variety of mismatched but charming dishes and teapots kept warm in knitted cozys. Many attendees dressed up for the occasion in hats and pearls.
